He's the golf world's Yoda, a soft-spoken sage with a famous student, preaching his teachings from a quiet locale. For most of his career, **Michael Bannon**, Rory McIlroy's longtime swing coach, has worked at sleepy Bangor Golf Club in Northern Ireland, far removed from the media spotlight. This year, though, Bannon emerges from seclusion to hit the road as McIlroy's full-time traveling

instructor. Sure, his first allegiance is to Rory, but now he'll be out in the public eye. Given the results Bannon has shown, he's bound to be a sought-after commodity on a Tour where everyone is always looking for an edge.

Prediction: "At the outset, I'm sure Bannon will do his best to remain under the radar, and the McIlroy camp will want to keep him close," Bastable says. "But that's going to be hard once he's out there day to day. Guys are going to see him on the road and on the range, and they're going to want to know his secrets. Don't be surprised if Bannon starts working his magic on some other big names, too."

The Next Course You'll Want to Play

Golf in Nicaragua? "Right," we hear you saying. "More people play golf on the moon." That's about to change with the emergence of **Mukul Luxury Resort & Spa**, set to open in February with an attention-grabbing 18-hole course. Its designer, David McLay Kidd, is a kilt-wearing Scotsman, best known for Bandon Dunes, his wind-buffeted links in southwest Oregon.
